### Arnold Ridley

Arnold Ridley was born in Bath on 7th January 1896. He began his acting career in Bristol University. He trained as a teacher and taught for a while, but after a short time returned to acting.

He was severely injured at the Somme during the Great War. In 1917 he was invalided out with injuries which affected him for the rest of his life.

In due course the war injuries forced him to give up acting and he began to write plays. In 1923 he wrote "The Ghost Train". The first professional performance of the play was at St Martin's Theatre, London, in 1925, after which it eventually became a worldwide success. It was later adapted for the cinema (the film "Oh Mr Porter" in which Will Hay played was based on the play).

Arnold was once again seen in army uniform when he was cast as the vague and rather frail Private Godfrey in the television series "Dad's Army"

He died in 1984 at the age of 88.

### Railway Stage Props

The Furness Railway Trust is pleased to help Hornby Drama Group by providing a number of items to help set the railway scene for "The Ghost Train".

The Trust, a registered charity, is based on the Lakeside and Haverthwaite Railway; its prime purpose is the restoration of railway vehicles.
